

BOAT RAMP STEWARDS PROTECT OUR LAKES

Each summer, a team of more than 100 Lake Stewards inspect boats at launch ramps in the Adirondacks to ensure that invasive plants and animals do not get introduced into our lakes.



Adirondack Park. AWI stewards also operate boat wash stations at a number of locations to provide free boat wash service for boats and trailers to remove any invasive species. Also, Camp-of-the-Woods assigns members of their staff to inspect all boats being launched at their boat ramp.

Funding for this activity is provided by New York State Dept. of Environmental Conservation (DEC). The program is administered by the Adirondack Watershed Institute (AWI) at Paul Smith's College, in the

To supplement the efforts of those workers, the Town of Lake Pleasant and LPSA provide additional funding to hire part-time Lake Stewards to monitor local boat ramps on days when the AWI employees are not on-duty. This summer, Darcy Foutch and Bob Hogan helped provide important monitoring of boats being launched at Moffitt Beach, Speculator Pavilion, and Lake Pleasant Marine. Collectively, the Lake Stewards at these locations in our local area inspected over 2,000 boats. Membership fees and donations from LPSA members provide the funding for our Lake Stewards. INVASIVE PLANT TRAINING SEMINAR

The Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program (APIPP) and Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District (HCSWCD) co-sponsored a training seminar on August 6 to help people learn how to identify a number of invasive plants that pose a threat to lakes in the Adirondacks.

Brian Greene, APIPP's Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator, shared information on a number of invasive plants that threaten the health of our lakes, and he showed how to look for these plants in the water.



APIPP provides training and support to lake associations and individual volunteers throughout the Adirondack Park to fight against invasive plants and animals. We were very fortunate to have this training presented here in our area this summer, at the Speculator Pavilion. Sixteen people attended the training session, including six LPSA members.

Also, we were very fortunate to have Brian Greene as our guest speaker at our June luncheon, where he provided similar invasive species information to our members.



REMEMBER TO USE LOCAL FIREWOOD WHEN CAMPING

Many people like to take firewood from their homes before traveling to a campsite. Invasive pests like the [emerald ash borer](#) or [Asian long-horned beetle](#) often hitch a ride to new areas in untreated firewood. As a result, transport of untreated firewood across the state has caused outbreaks of these damaging pests.

Since 2009, New York State has regulated the movement of firewood to keep the spread of invasives down. If you choose to use untreated firewood, it must have been grown in New York and cannot be moved more than 50 miles from where it was grown or its source. Producers of firewood for sale are allowed to declare their business as the source provided the wood was grown within 50 miles of their business, and they must maintain documentation. Those moving untreated firewood for their own use must fill out a [Self-Issued Certificate of Origin](#) (PDF). Treated firewood, which has been heated to a core temperature of 160° F for 75 minutes and labeled as "New York Approved Heat-treated Firewood/ Pest Free," can be moved without restrictions. DEC has an [interactive map](#) that shows if the firewood's source and its destination are within 50 miles.



Violation of firewood regulations can result in fines, penalties, and the potential destruction of beloved trees and habitats. The safest way to enjoy a campfire and protect New York forests is to buy and burn local firewood at your destination.

AN ANIMAL-EATING PLANT IN OUR LAKES!

I was trained as a botanist, so I am always interested in learning about, and telling others about, carnivorous plants (plants that eat animals). Sort of the revenge of the Plant Kingdom over its oppressors, the animals. We have one in our lakes with the inelegant name of Bladderwort (or *Utricularia* if you want to impress your friends). It has feathery leaves and is often mistaken by our lake monitors for the invasive milfoil (see photo).

Whereas milfoil has four feather-like leaves coming from the stem at a given point, *Utricularia* has a much more complex leaf arrangement. However, the most important characteristic separating the two is that *Utricularia* has abundant small oval "pouches" scattered throughout the bushy stem. These pouches are really animal traps with quite a complex structure:



There is an opening at one end of the trap with multiple hair-like structures and the body is an empty pod shaped like a bean. At rest the trap's shape is something like a balloon with squished-in sides. When a small aquatic animal comes close to the trap's "mouth," the shape of the trap changes so that the sides expand outward, thus increasing the volume inside. This creates an inward flow of water that brings the animal into the trap where it is digested. Studies

have shown that the nutrients from the animal are later found within the tissues of the *Utricularia*. Fortunately, even our little toe is way too big to fit into these traps, so we're safe from these ferocious botanical predators.
